ORGANISATION STRUCTURE

The International Pharmaceutical Students' Federation, abbreviated as IPSF, is the leading international advocacy organization for pharmaceutical students and recent graduates, promoting improved through provision of information, education. health networking and a range of publications and professional initiatives.

The IPSF was formed in London in 1949 with eight (8) member countries. The federation now represents approximately 500,000 pharmacy and pharmaceutical science students and recent graduates from one hundred and twenty eight (128) member organizations in more than ninety-seven (97) countries worldwide.

The IPSF headquarters is located in The Hague, Netherlands. IPSF works in close collaboration with the International Pharmaceutical Federation (FIP), which supports and hosts the IPSF Secretariat based in The Hague, Netherlands.

Under IPSF, there are five regional offices:

- 1. IPSF-AfRO African Regional Office
- 2. IPSF-APRO -Asia Pacific Regional Office
- 3. IPSF-EMRO -Eastern Mediterranean Regional Office
- 4. IPSF-EuRO European Regional Office
- 5. IPSF-PARO Pan American Regional Office





History of the IPSF: The IPSF - African Regional Office was established in 2008 during the 54th IPSF World Congress in Cluj-Napoca, Romania. IPSF-AfRO is coordinated by the Regional Working Group. IPSF-AfRO consists of 25 Member Organizations in 23 Countries. IPSF- AfRO organizes the African Pharmaceutical Symposium (AfPS) annually. IPSF-AfRO has hosted 10 editions of the IPSF African Pharmaceutical Symposium (AfPS).

The African Pharmaceutical Symposium is a unique event hosted by an African country that wins the bid to host at the previous conference. It is annual regional symposium for IPSF AfRO. AfPS seeks to improve the relations between pharmacy students and recent graduates from different countries, backgrounds, and cultures.

It brings on board major stakeholders to help address health issues in the country. It serves a major opportunity for pharmacy students and recent graduates to expand their network.




HARARE INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY (HIT) LN. -17.83875533818521, LT. 31.00746236931367




MANNA SAFARIS & RESORTS








MUSEUM OF AFRICAN LIBERATION











NYAMGOMBE FALLS LN. -18.2847221, L.T. 32.6788290










TROUTBECK RESORT, INYANGA LN. -18.179816668212553, LT. 32.80887334056493








TRANSPORTATION


